Dear Colleagues in Ministry, One of my joys these past few weeks has been watching the leaves change. Indeed, I had begun to despair, as it seemed that only a few trees were changing, particularly three trees – each with its own distinctive color along the road as I headed north on 212. It didn't help as I listened to the evening news, during which the weather person would weigh the right conditions - including enough precipitation and a timely cold snap to set God's creation into motion. Of course, I may have completely misunderstood what I was hearing on the news, for it's been a while since I've experienced, "fall." Some would say that Florida only has two seasons – "summer is coming" and "summer is here." Yet if you paid enough attention, you can see signs of change, as I was told that the pelicans which wintered in Lakeland, FL, flew down from Minnesota. So too, the trees and flowers have their own schedule as to when they will bloom.

The church also has its own sense of time, a movement by which we encounter the sacred in our everyday lives. Indeed, in the days ahead, we will take a moment to honor those members of our community who have died in the past year. Though we may grieve their absence, we will continue to give honor to their lives by witnessing to their abiding presence in us as we tell their stories, but not only that: we will acknowledge how their abiding presence continues to shape our community. Their lives made a difference, and they challenge us to continue that difference.

I would also invite you to join with me in prayers for our community, as well as our world. Sometimes it's difficult to watch the evening news for it seems as if we are losing time. Having been to Israel and the West Bank. I have met with both Jews and Palestinians, so I wonder what is happening to them. So too I think of my interfaith colleagues at Hartford Seminary, Con- 6 a time for searching and a time for necticut, with whom we shared our encounters with the Holy Other. What do they make of this time? What would they have to say about their world? More importantly, are they safe? Are their families safe?

Perhaps the most important message in our sacred texts is that the time is now! Now is the time to get to know your neighbors. Now is the time to reconnect with a brother or a sister. Now is the time to reach out to another community which you have wondered about but were afraid of seeming foolish by asking the wrong thing. It's time.



Book is: *Toward a Hopeful Future* by Phil Snyder and Emily Bowen. You do not have to have your own copy of the book but it will be helpful.



However, I have a real deal for each and every one of you. It is called 'a game of chance' as part of the history that I have been talking about in the last few articles that I have written.





Garbage isn't just trash anymore! Many people recycle large amounts of disposable items at home.

Recently, a church member noticed a LOT of recyclable trash in the regular garbage can. It seems that she was able to decrease the amount of "garbage" by about 2/3rds after taking out the recyclables. That started a discussion about what is recyclable, what isn't and can "we" comingle our recycle materials or do we have to separate everything out?

The good news is that most of the recycling can be comingled together. The bad news is that there are a few things that are rejects and go into the regular trash. The other bad news is that containers need to be relatively clean, PLEASE RINSE.

In a recent newspaper article from the Recycling Educator for Lyon and Yellow Medicine Counties there are some very helpful reminders.

ALUMINUM-pop/other beverage cans, pie tins/trays. TIN CANS-can leave labels on.

GLASS BOTTLES/JARS-food and beverage only. Labels can stay on. Remove and discard caps.

PLASTIC CONTAINERS-bottles/jugs/containers marked with recycling symbol. Again labels may stay on.

PLASTIC BAGS-shopping bags/dry cleaning bags. Put them in a similar bag and tie it shut.

NEWSPAPER/HOME/OFFICE PAPER-dry and clean. If paper is shredded, place in a clear bag and tie shut.

CARDBOARD/PAPER GROCERY BAGS-break down and flatten boxes. Clean and dry only.

PAPERBOARD PACKAGING- cereal/cracker type boxes, etc. Remove liners, plastic, cellophane. NO ice cream/ margarine boxes.

Do not recycle screw-on lids, aerosol cans, paint cans, scrap metal, dishes, cups, bowls, mirrors, window glass, lightbulbs, ceramics, vases, Styrofoam, hoses/pipe, tubing, food-to-go containers, anything that has held hazardous materials. Also do not recycle wet/dirty/greasy paper, food wrappers, waxed paper, bubble-wrap/plastic lined envelopes. No bottle caps, i.e. pop or milk tops, straws. No medical waste—(medications KSD).

FYI—our coffee cups are NOT recyclable. KSD

Audrey Zempel by Dick Anderson

Who is that back row lady in church on Sunday mornings? I suspect you're thinking of Audrey Zempel.

Audrey was born on November 4th 1928 to Grover and Selma Inlay in Willmar, Minnesota. She is the oldest of six siblings, three boys and three girls. One of Audrey's brothers was born deaf and attended school in Faribault. All three of Audrey's brothers are now passed, but her sisters are still living.

Audrey graduated from Willmar High School in 1946. While a student she worked in a grocery store and after graduation she went to work as a bookkeeper for a local business.

Her grandparents lived in Granite Falls where she visited often, thinking "Why would anyone want to live in such a small town?" As luck would have it she found the answer to that question. Through a mutual friend she met and in 1948 married LeRoy Zempel.

After working for a painter in Sleepy Eye, LeRoy and his brothers decided to open a business in downtown Granite Falls in 1950 (of course Audrey was dragged along). It was 1957 when they built the store on the highway, Zempel Painting and Decorating. Audrey did all of the bookkeeping as well as running the paint store. LeRoy passed away in 2006 and Audrey placed a stained glass window over the front door in his memory.



Audrey has two children, Cheryl (Lake Wilson) and Alan (Granite Falls), four grandchildren and five great grandchildren. She has been a member of our church since 1950 and has served as Treasurer, Sunday School teacher and on virtually every board and committee over these last 65 years.

She still keeps the Memorial Book up to date and sends out "thinking of you" cards from the church during times of joy or sadness. Audrey has for many years now devoted herself to reading the Bible for fifteen minutes every day. This allows her to read all sixty-six books in a calendar year. Her hobbies and passions include: the Twins and Vikings, playing cards, puzzling of all types and reading. She enjoys baking but not so much now that she's all alone at her new home in Henry Hill apartments.

Perhaps her most interesting hobby is as a pen pal. For the last 74 years, since she was 13, Audrey has been faithful pen pals with a friend in North Carolina and one in Australia. Who even does that these days?


